Introduction

Definition

- Strategic frameworks that outline the health services deemed essential for a population, prioritizing cost-effectiveness, equity and sustainability.
- They aim to address health needs while optimizing the use of limited resources.

Core objectives

- Ensure access to high-priority promotive, preventive, curative, and rehabilitative health services.
- Reduce financial barriers to accessing care.
- Strengthen health system performance and equity.

Global relevance

- Integral to achieving Universal Health Coverage (UHC) and SDG 3.8.
- NEHCPs serve as a policy tool for governments to allocate resources effectively.



Why NEHCPs are critical?

Address inequities in access to healthcare and improve service delivery for vulnerable populations.

Respond to shifting disease burdens, including NCDs and emerging health threats.

The need for

NEHCPs

Provide a structured approach to prioritize interventions based on population needs.

Key impacts


Enhances health outcomes by focusing on highimpact interventions.

Prevents financial hardship through public financing mechanisms.

Strengthens accountability and transparency in health spending



Designing NEHCPs: Key steps







Importance of stakeholder engagement

Promotes transparency, accountability, and trust in the NEHCP process.

Ensures the package reflects the needs and priorities of the population.

Stakeholder involvement

Case study

Zanzibar actively involved patient groups, community reps, and healthcare workers to enhance fairness and inclusivity in decision-making.

Best practices

Establish mechanisms for continuous feedback and dialogue.

Use participatory approaches such as deliberative workshops and citizen panels.



Financing NEHCPs

Approaches to financing

- Implement progressive universalism by prioritizing interventions that benefit the most vulnerable populations.
- Explore mixed financing models, including public funding, cost-sharing, and private sector contributions.

Challenges

- Limited fiscal space and competing priorities in lowresource settings.
- Dependence on external donor funding for specific interventions.

Case study

 Pakistan developed a phased financing strategy to sustainably implement its NEHCP while securing donor and government commitments



Transition to implementation Key prerequisites for successful implementation



High-level political commitment

 Secure support from government leaders, legislators, and policymakers.



Capacity building

 Invest in training for health workers, managers, and policymakers.



System alignment:

 Ensure NEHCPs are integrated with existing health policies, infrastructure, and financing mechanisms.



Challenges in NEHCPs implementation

Common challenges

Resource constraints

Inadequate funding, human resources, and infrastructure.

Health system gaps

- Weak information and referral systems
- Fragmented service delivery.

Political and institutional barriers

 Limited coordination among stakeholders and resistance to change.



Monitoring and Evaluation

The role of M&E

- Tracks progress in implementation and identifies areas for improvement.
- Provides data to assess the impact of NEHCPs on health outcomes and financial protection.

Framework for M&E

- Develop core indicators aligned with SDG 3.8.1 (service coverage) and 3.8.2 (financial risk protection).
- Create country-specific indicators to address local priorities and challenges.

Case study

 Pakistan's M&E framework integrated routine health information systems and periodic surveys to monitor progress



Strategies for effective NEHCPs

Institutional strengthening

Establish governance structures to oversee NEHCP processes.

Capacity development

Train
personnel at all
levels to
enhance
technical and
managerial
capabilities.

Sustainable financing

Align NEHCPs with national budgets and explore innovative financing solutions.

Contextspecific adaptation

Customize NEHCPs to address local needs while learning from global best practices.

Continuous M&E

Build robust systems to monitor implementation and improve accountability





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
